ITALIAN CAMOUFLAGE & MARKINGS

In common with camouflage practices in the W.W. II Italian Airforce (Regia Aeronautica), insignia standards corresponded to broad guidelines but there was wide variation in the actual execution of the relevant directives. Accordingly, while the following observations are generally applicable, exceptions were not uncommon.

At the beginning of W.W. II most Italian aircraft were marked in civilian guise, even when the veneer was patently thin. Moreover there was a long delay after war was declared until some machines finally got their military finish so that pre-war finishes remained prevalent for a time. This generally consisted of:

a. Wing fasces in 4 positions. These were usually either white on a black base or the reverse, and positioned about 70-80% of the distance out from the midline to the wingtip. The "blade" always faced outboard, and the diameter was about 60% of the wing chord at that point but not overlapping onto control surfaces.

b. Fuselage fasces with full color "faggots and blade" on a pale blue circle 30cm in diameter. These were located just forward of the cockpit on both sides, and the "blade" always faced forward.

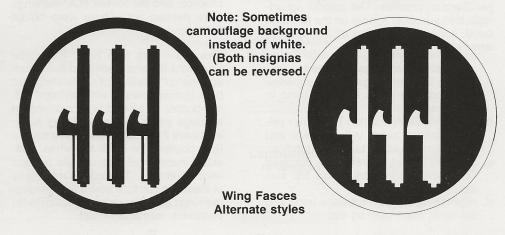
c. Vertical, full height green/white/red stripes (green forward) on the rudder. Occasionally the green portion was painted **ahead** of the rudder post, and sometimes the Arms of the House of Savoia was found at about mid-height of the white bar.

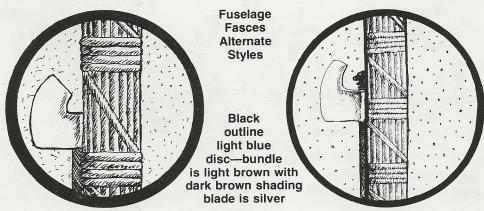
d. Civil registration codes of 5 letters (ex. I-ABCD) on both sides of the fuselage and under the top wing. These were painted in either black, white, or black with white outline depending on background.

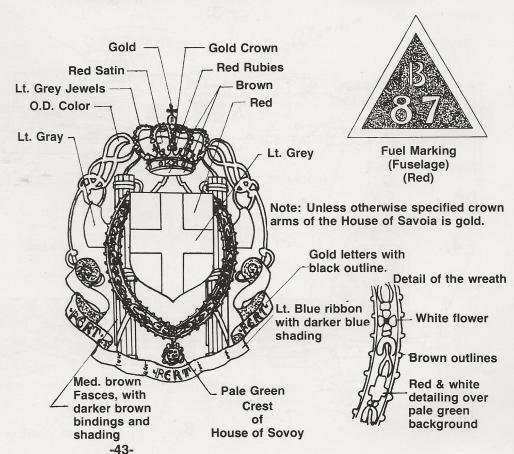
e. Later on Squadriglia and Aircraft numbers began to appear on both sides of fuselage (ex. 90-12).

In the Fall of 1940 the Germans asked the Italians to devise a rapid recognition marking and the R.A. response was a white, 1/2 meter wide fuselage band (1 meter on multi-engined aircraft) starting one meter ahead of the leading edge of the tailplane. At the same time the rudder tricolor was abandoned (as looking too similar to French practice) and replaced by a white cross usually confined to the rudder only, and usually with the Arms of the House of Savoia at the intersection point (applied as a decal). An individual aircraft serial number ("matricula militaire") in black or white (ex. M.M.1234) appeared on both sides of the fuselage just ahead of the tailplane, often under the aircraft designaArt by

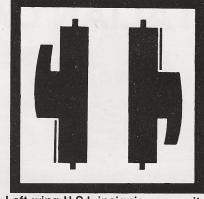
tion (ex. Fiat CR.42) in 10 cm high letters. As the war continued squadriglia and aircraft numbers gradually diminished in size. the aircraft number portion took on individual squadriglia colors, and eventually these tended to disappear completely, replaced by an individual aircraft number as per German practice. The colorful squadriglia badges could appear on the fuselage band, nose, tail, or not at all (it was very

Special markings included:

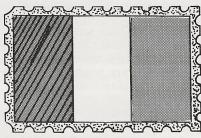
- a. African Theater large black X superimposed on the white fuselage band in some cases.
- b. Belgian/Balkan/Russian Theaters yellow fuselage band, yellow cowls and lower wingtips as per Luftwaffe practice.
- c. Sea and Desert aircraft red, diagonal 'anti-camouflage" stripes on top surface of upper wing.
- d. Night flying aircraft fuselage band and tail cross often blacked out.

After the surrender of September 1943 the Regia Aeronautica split into two factions:

- a. The pro allied side (the "Italian Co-Belligerent Air Force") re-adopted the W.W.I red/white/green roundels (green center) in 6 positions, similar to British practice, and the former R.A. markings were painted out. There were no fin flashes.
- b. The pro axis side (the "Republica Socialista Italiana") adopted the "postage stamp" marking of red/white/green bars (green forward) with serrated yellow border all around in 4 positions on fuselage sides and tailfin. Wing markings were 2 opposed Fasces in a square (four positions) in black and white. Individual number and squadriglia badges were continued. Toward the end many of these aircraft took on frankly German markings as the pretence of Italian independence was abandoned.

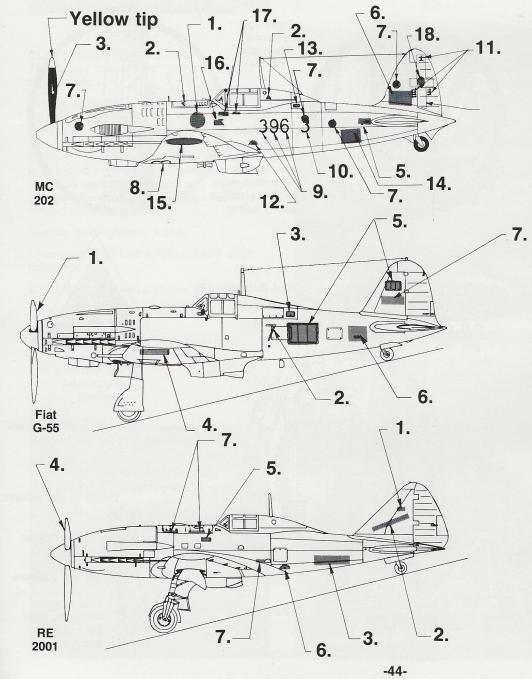
